

Presidents Diary

My first week in office ended with the sad news of the passing of our founding member Dean Olafsen on Tuesday 13 September 2024 after a long illness bravely born. His funeral was held at the Ipswich Uniting Church on Wednesday 21 September 2024. Twenty-four members from the shed attended the funeral and formed a guard of honour outside the church after the service. A talk was given by Terry Carter, our immediate Past President, on behalf of the shed. Rest in peace Dean and thank you.

Hearing Australia visited the shed on Tuesday 27th August 2024 when members were given the opportunity of having their hearing checked. Unfortunately, it appears that since our last check-ups some 40% of those tested have experienced further hearing loss requiring further testing. To this end it is intended to enforce the wearing of hearing protection, erect additional signage and educate members in the wisdom of wearing protection.

On Thursday 29 September 2024 Terry and I visited Day Care Ward 6B at the Ipswich Hospital where an iPad was donated to them. The pad will be used by patients to pass the time whilst awaiting treatment.

With membership reaching optimum levels and with working space at a premium attention will be given to removing material that is no longer required. Attention will also be given to improving housekeeping standards throughout the shed and the cooperation of members will be sought in this regard. A start has already been made with the removal of unwanted steel and thanks are extended to Rob Burt for overseeing its removal.

Planning is well advanced to provide an area where meetings and social activities can take place thus removing the need to use the kitchen. Thanks are extended all involved especially John Kenneally for all their hard work. It is hoped to reach a decision by years end.


I am pleased to announce the appointment of John Stavridis as the new Welfare Officer. John has some progressive ideas on how he intends handling his portfolio and I wish him well.

Providing a suitable dust extraction system in the machine Annex area is still a priority and is being actively pursued.

The re-testing of machine operators is under consideration and will be discussed at the next committee meeting.

Rev. Dean Olafsen (1941–2024)

"ALL Aussie boys need a shed," they say, and Dean Olafsen took that saying to heart. With unwavering dedication, he founded the Ipswich Men's Shed—a haven where hands crafted, hearts opened, and hidden grief found solace.

Dean understood that life's later chapters could be lonely, especially for retirees. So, he created a space where men aged 18 to 80 could gather, tinker, and share stories. The shed wasn't just about woodworking or metalworking; it was about forging connections. Dean believed that within those walls, laughter echoed, friendships bloomed, and burdens lightened.

As the Bundamba Men's Shed flourished, Dean's vision expanded. He dreamed of an annex—a place for counselling, support, and healing. His heart overflowed with compassion for those carrying hidden grief, and he wanted them to find solace within those walls.

The shed itself was more than timber and nails. It was a testament to community support. Donations poured in—from varnishes to woodworking machines—each gift a symbol of care. Dean's tireless efforts, along with the Salvation Army and local businesses, transformed a flood-damaged space into a vibrant hub.

Dean Olafsen, a man of action and empathy, left an indelible mark. His legacy lives on in the laughter of men who once felt alone, in the hands that shape wood, and in the hearts that found kinship.

May he rest in peace, knowing that the shed he built continues to echo with camaraderie and shared dreams.




